"I always refer to style as sound," says Leonard. "The sound of the writing." Some of Leonard's suggestions appeared in a 2001 *New York Times* article that became the basis of his 2007 book, *Elmore Leonard's 10 Rules of Writing*. Here are those rules in outline form:

- 1. Never open a book with the weather.
- 2. Avoid prologues.
- 3. Never use a verb other than "said" to carry dialogue.
- 4. Never use an adverb to modify the verb "said."
- 5. Keep your exclamation points under control!
- 6. Never use the words "suddenly" or "all hell broke loose."
- 7. Use regional dialect, patois, sparingly.
- 8. Avoid detailed descriptions of characters.
- 9. Same for places and things.
- 10. Leave out the parts readers tend to skip.
- 11. If it sounds like writing, re-write it.
