Beverly Jenkins, keynote


Beverly Jenkins is the recipient of the 2018 Michigan Author Award by the Michigan Library Association, the 2017 Romance Writers of America Nora Roberts Lifetime Achievement Award, and the 2016 Romantic Times Reviewers' Choice Award for historical romance. She has been nominated for the NAACP Image Award in Literature and was featured in the documentary *Love Between the Covers* and on *CBS Sunday Morning*. Since the publication of *Night Song* in 1994, she has led the charge for inclusive romance and has been a constant darling of reviewers, fans, and her peers alike, garnering accolades for her work from the likes of *The Wall Street Journal, People Magazine, NPR*, and the *New York Times*.

Mira Landry is an associate literary agent with Corvisiero Literary Agency, currently acquiring upmarket and literary YA and adult fiction. After a decade building her own

business as a photographer, she's eager to help authors turn their art into a career. As a chair on the Rocky Mountain Fiction Writers' Board of Directors, she's dedicated to building writing and literary communities through events and educational programming, and was co-chair for their Colorado Gold Conference. She has a Bachelors from the University of British Columbia and a Certificate of Creative Writing from Simon Fraser University. She also co-hosts a podcast called Writers Who Read, analyzing recently published books using Literary Forensics.

interned at Foundry Literary & Media and Pegasus Books, and she has experience working as a bookseller. Originally from Madison, Connecticut, Nicole graduated with Distinction from McGill University, where she earned a Joint Honors B.A. in English Literature and International Development.

Currently seeking: Nicole is drawn to voice-driven, contemporary upmarket "book club" fiction featuring strong female protagonists, psychological thrillers that subvert the genre (i.e. unreliable female narrators, female perpetrators, etc.) select coming-of-age stories and select historical fiction, with an emphasis across all genres on amplifying underrepresented voices. 

The Workshops

Note: Beginner, intermediate and professional designations are meant to correspond to the audience's experience with writing, not the topic in question. For example, classes on expertise (like martial arts or the legal system) are classified as beginner level because even novice writers can use the information, even though the workshops might provide expert-level information within their discipline.

- Everyone: Content for writers at every stage, from beginners to advanced. These sessions offer insights and techniques useful to all, regardless of experience.
- **Beginner:** Introduction of basic concepts, defining common terms, a general overview of a topic, or a focus on getting started.
- Intermediate: Attendees at this level know the basics and want to grow further.
- Advanced: Attendees at this level are most likely published either independently or traditionally and are in need of tools and techniques to put it all together as well as career-level considerations.

These categories are only guides, and you need not have previous knowledge/experience of a topic to attend any workshop. A floor plan can be found at the end of this program.

RMFW's contest for unpublished writers, the Gold Rush Literary Awards, was born in 1989/90 with four categories: romance, sci-fi, fantasy, and mainstream, and was established to generate funding for organizational programming. The categories have changed along with the industry, but the contest is judged first by RMFW members and then by VIP judges chosen for their expertise in their category. Winners receive \$150, an official certificate, a trophy, and a 5-minute reading of their work during a conference luncheon on Sunday. Finalists receive \$50 and an official certificate. Both receive a secondary pitch session at the conference with a participating agent or editor.

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
